The Lions Club of Sydney Chinese Teal Ribbon Fellowship Scheme 2009

Lions' Object:

To provide a forum for the open discussion of all matters of public interest

To partner with individuals and organizations to improve our community and to help those We Serve

Introduction

The Lions Club of Sydney Chinese Teal Ribbon Fellowship Scheme is offered with a view to supporting mainland public health/medical professionals to further their professional development or research in Sydney Australia for the diseases of ovarian cancer, uterine cancer, cervical cancer, food allergies, sexual assault, substance abuse, polycystic ovarian syndrome, pain and distress disorder (includes PTSD), obsessive and compulsive disorder, dissociative identity disorder, Tourette syndrome and fragile X syndrome.



Objectives

The objectives are to facilitate experience sharing between the mainland and local workers, to enhance technical exchange on diseases management and prevention, and to encourage collaboration and networking.

Eligibility Criteria

- 1. The applicant must be a citizen of the People's Republic of China.
- 2. The applicant should have been practising medicine or public health or involved in related work in China for more than 3 years.
- 3. The applicant should have at least one year's experience in a related field in China and would continue to work in this field after the fellowship programme.
- 4. The applicant must be involved in community-based care and prevention work in China. Subject to sufficient justification, at most 2 applicants can apply in collaboration with each other to carry out the same training programme for two weeks in Sydney.
- 5. The applicant should be responsible for planning or implementation of the training programme to be applied for under this scheme. In case there are two applicants, then the applicants should preferably be from different fields of work. Preference will be given to front-line workers in the community.

Award

The <u>maximum</u> award for one applicant is AUD\$1,000 and AUD\$500 each for two applicants from the same training programme.

The applicant(s), if successful, must bear all the expenses arising from this scheme, including travelling expenses to and out of Sydney, fees for boarding & lodgings, traffic and other related expenses in Sydney. It is also strongly advised that travel and medical insurance should be taken out to cover medical expenses that might be incurred during his/her stay in Sydney.

Programme Content and Evaluation

The applicant must state in detail the training or research programme which he/she proposes to be implemented or collaborated in Sydney. The vetting committee will examine his/her proposals in-depth and provide logistics support from time to time as appropriate. The successful applicant may be deployed to be on attachment in health care organizations in Sydney or involved in field work, community based projects, research, or a combination of these.

Assessment would be conducted throughout the training period. Besides, during his/her two weeks' stay in Sydney, the successful applicant must hold two seminars on the chosen condition/research/programme implementation and/or evaluation of patient care and prevention work in their locality; etc. One seminar is designed for professionals in the field while the other one is for the general public. In addition, he/she should submit a preliminary written report before departure from Sydney.

How to Apply for

The Teal Ribbon Fellowship Scheme

Upon completion of the programme and satisfactory performance, he/she will be awarded an attendance certificate for the "Lions Club of Sydney Chinese Teal Ribbon Fellowship Scheme". The Certificate for Lions Club of Sydney Chinese Teal Ribbon Fellow will be issued and mailed to the successful applicant at his/her place of work upon receipt of the final report or signed Memorandum of Cooperation or Memorandum of Understanding with local institution which should be handed in within 3 months of completion of the fellowship. Grant award will only be offered upon satisfactory completion of fellowship.

Further, should there be two applicants from the same project, the 2 applications would be examined by the vetting committee together. Successful applicants have to carry out the study at the same time in Sydney. The pair is required to hold the 2 seminars and to hand in 1 final report only.

Application

- 1. An eligible applicant should submit an application which includes:
 - i. Name (both Chinese and English).
 - ii. Contact address and numbers (telephone, fax, and email).
 - iii. Name of current working organization and rank.
 - iv. Qualifications and experience.
 - v. Tenure for academic exchange abroad, if any.
 - vi. A description of his/her own aspirations and the professional goals.
 - vii. Details of the patient care or prevention programmes he/she has participated in China.
 - viii. A description of the proposed training programme including the main themes, activities, its relevance to the mainland situation, duration, and any special arrangement needed. If a research project is to be conducted, the methods and expected output should be included.
 - ix. Date of arrival and departure from Sydney.
 - x. Name of the staff from the same organization/department who have participated any activities organised by the Lions Club of Sydney Chinese and the date of previous arrival in Sydney.
- 2. Each applicant should submit one application. In case there are two applicants in the same programme proposal, the two application forms must be submitted at the same time.

There should be two letters of reference for each applicant. The completed applications should be submitted to Lions Club of Sydney Chinese at :

Deadline for application and acceptance

The deadline of the current round of application is set at 28^{th} September, 2009. Successful applicants would be informed by mail, and/or email by 18 October 2009. Unsuccessful applicants will not be notified separately.

Special Remarks

- 1. Successful applicants must arrive at Sydney in between Nov 2009 to Jan 2010 to proceed with the training programme under the scheme. They must also apply to the appropriate authorities to obtain a visa to Sydney. If the successful applicant could not arrive in Sydney by 15 Jan 2010, the award would be automatically cancelled.
- 2. Except being a Fellowship awarding organization, Lions Club of Sydney Chinese assumes no liability whatsoever during the candidate's stay in Australia
- 3. Invitation letter(s) for Visa application should be issued by a correspondence organization in Australia. The Lions Club of Sydney Chinese shall not issue such letters.
- 4. If the successful applicant leave earlier before the completion of the whole study, he/she will not be offered the grant award; his/her senior and/or referees shall be informed.
- 5. The successful applicant must acknowledge the "Lions Club of Sydney Chinese Teal Ribbon Fellowship Scheme" for any MOU/MOC signed with Australian organization(s) and for any publications or research work projects resulting completely or partly from the Fellowship Scheme.
